The room location for the Final Exam depends on the student's recitation section. **NOTE THE ROOM ASSIGNMENTS as follows. BE SURE TO GO TO THE CORRECT ROOM. THERE WILL BE A 5 POINT DEDUCTION FOR ANYONE WHO TAKES THE EXAM IN THE WRONG ROOM.**

All students must take the exam at this time unless there is justifiable cause for missing that time. There are some circumstances which can lead to a valid conflict with the Saturday Final Exam time slot. For such conflicts, the alternate time slot is Thursday, December 6, 5:30 - 8:00 pm in EH 103. In order to take the Alternate Final Exam during that time slot, you must obtain an Admit Slip from your Senior Instructor (Drs. Hoyt, Powe, Noble or Franco) in advance, by Monday, December 3. **THIS IS IMPORTANT!** In order to obtain the Admit Slip, you must provide your Senior Instructor with proper, hard-copy (paper) documentation for the justifiable cause of missing the Saturday Final.

For students who cannot make the Saturday Final or the Thursday Alternate, and who are invoking the University Excused Absence Policy as justifiable cause, then they must submit a registration assignment with their Senior Instructor by 6:00 pm, Thursday, November 31. (NOTE: A notification earlier in the semester needs to be freshly confirmed, since schedules and circumstances change.) **THIS IS IMPORTANT!** This registration assignment requires presentation of proper, hard-copy (paper) documentation for the cause of the miss; a schedule of the student's Final Exams; a schedule of any other justifiable (and documented) conflicts during the period of December 10 through December 12 inclusive; and, a preferred email contact address. A time slot for a second alternate Final Exam will be set up for all such students in all classes, which could be anytime on December 10, 11 or 12. Students will be given at least 48 hours advance notice by email of the start time of the exam. (The 48 hours can include weekend hours.) Students taking this final exam may receive an incomplete in the meantime, in order to allow timely submission of grades for the remainder of the class.

For other students who cannot make the Saturday Final or the Thursday Alternate for a justifiable cause, but one which does not fall under the University Excused Absence Policy, then they must contact their Senior Instructor as soon as possible after becoming aware of the conflict. These will be handled on a case by case basis, and may involve an incomplete for the semester.

For all students, a missed Final Exam without justifiable cause will score as zero.

Be certain to report for the Exam at the time specified. Late arrivals will be permitted up to 30 minutes, but **THERE WILL BE NO ARRIVALS PERMITTED AFTER THAT**. Those arriving after that time will be considered to have missed the Exam and will score zero.

Students will be required to stay for at least 30 minutes. There will be no departures in the first 30 minutes.

No bathroom breaks are permitted. Plan accordingly! Exceptions will be made for medical cause. Students with known medical conditions which require timely bathroom breaks must present a medical note of that need to their Senior Instructor by Thursday, December 6, 12:00 n.

The format of the Saturday Final Exam will be standard multiple-choice, machine-graded (Scantron). There will be 15 questions scoring four points each related to newer material (Chapters 25 - 33). There will be 20 questions scoring two points each related to older material (Chapters 1 - 24). The material coverage includes all material for which students were responsible on prior exams this semester, unless specifically modified. Alternate Exams may differ from this format.

For the Final Exam, bring the following **ESSENTIAL** items.

pencils and eraser (Scantron does not reliably read ink.)

an **ALLOWED** (no alphabetic memory) calculator with live batteries, **AND**

picture identification (e.g., student ID or driver's license)

The sighting of a banned calculator will result in a deduction of ten points and removal of the calculator.

All nonmedical, electronic communication devices (phones, ear buds, Apple watches, etc., etc., etc.) must be silenced and must be out of view during the Exam. If any such device is heard or seen, then there will be a deduction of ten points. (Laptops may be in view but must be closed.) Students with justifiable cause (e.g., job-required) who need to have these devices audibly active or in view must report this to a Senior Instructor beforehand.

The determination of the course grade and the letter grade breakdown were described in the original course syllabus. From where you stand now, you can estimate the required Final Exam score needed to achieve a certain letter grade. This calculation provides a minimum grade. A higher grade can sometimes be achieved, especially in borderline cases. These are evaluated on an individual basis, utilizing a number of factors; one such factor is the performance on the Final Exam, and whether the student performed substantially better than on prior exams.
